#### SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

The programme aims to provide a thorough training for the professional actor, with an emphasis on preparing for work in classical and contemporary theatre, film, television, radio and digital media.

Through studio-based classes in voice, movement, acting techniques, singing, text analysis and contextual studies students undertake a practical and reflective training that gradually develops embodied understanding and skills in the art and craft of acting. We are committed to equitable, inclusive training that supports the development of the individual within the ensemble.

Professional development and industry engagement is integrated throughout the training, and performances in third year offer students real-world training and showcasing, in theatre, film and audio.

The programme is in-person, with at least 35 contact hours per week, on average. By the end of the training, graduates will have the skills, understanding and attitudes to prepare them for work in the theatre, film, radio and digital performance industries, as well as transferable skills in communication, teamwork, critical and analytical thinking, and problem solving.

The aims of the BA Acting (Hons) programme are to:

- 1. Develop students' embodied capacity for the vocal, physical, emotional, creative and imaginative skills required for professional acting
- 2. Develop students' theoretical and practical understanding of the disciplines of classical and contemporary performance, across all performance contexts
- 3. Develop students' reflective, critical thinking and research skills in order that they can be applied in all performance contexts, and the wider world
- 4. Develop students' ability to work collaboratively, empathetically and independently

- 5. Integrate professional practice and industry engagement throughout the training in support of students' growth and ambition to succeed as actors and in any other field they choose
- 6. Develop students' communication, ensemble ethos, and resilience so they may be applied to all performance contexts and the wider world
- 7. Encourage curiosity and passion for exploration, discovery and play, for any future career path and as life-long learners

Through studio-based classwork, projects and productions, the course aims to develop reflective and socially engaged practitioners, with the skills, expertise and resilience to establish independent careers as actors and performance-makers, and with the potential to be leaders and change-makers in the industry.

## **Key Progression Points (if applicable)**

You are required to achieve all credits in each year in order to progress to the next year. An assessment board meets at the end of each year to confirm students' progression into the next year, or graduation.

## **Options/Electives (if applicable)**

Except for Production 6 – Professional Placement, BA Acting (Hons) does not have options or electives. All other modules are compulsory. Professional Placement may be elected if the student actor is professionally cast in a suitable role that meets learning outcomes. It may not be elected without agreement of Director of Actor Training. Professional placement may be taken instead of Advanced or Extended Practice Production modules. It will not usually be possible to take Professional Placement as an alternative for Showcasing and Professional Development, Film or Contemporary Production modules though exceptions may be made. There are limitations on the number of Professional Placement module options available per year.

# Pre and Co-requisites (if applicable)

BA Acting (Hons) does not have pre or co-requisites for any module, but all modules must be passed to progress.

#### **Additional Credit**

BA Acting (Hons) does not permit additional credits to be taken.

## Learning and teaching methods

Learning and teaching takes place in group and 1:1 studio-based classes, group and 1:1 tutorials, seminar classes and rehearsals. Self-directed study hours include group and 1:1 research, practice, creative tasks, writing, reading and line learning.

## **Placements and Exchanges**

There are no placements and exchanges on the BA (Hons) Acting in first and second year. In third year, professional acting work may be considered as a placement provided it fulfils the learning outcomes and criteria as per the Professional Placement module specification (see above Options/Electives)..

#### ASSESSMENT POINT

#### Overview

BA Acting (Hons) is assessed using formative, cumulative, summative and integrative assessment methods.

In Level 4 assessment is cumulative and formative

In Level 5 assessment is cumulative, formative and integrative.

In Level 6 assessment is formative and summative.

## Assessment definitions

Formative assessment supports your continual learning and includes classroom observation and feedback, classroom presentations or sharings and feedback, reflective journal and portfolio review, 1:1 and group tutorials.

Cumulative assessment measures your ongoing developmental progress as you build on the learning and assessments of each previous stage in the training. There are termly cumulative assessment points in levels 4 and 5.

Integrative assessment combines learning from multiple modules into a single assessment, supporting the connections you are making between all areas of the training. Level 5 projects are integratively assessed.

Summative assessment takes place at the end of each level 6 module, measuring the knowledge and understanding, skills and abilities, and professional competencies evident in your rehearsal process and performances.

## What do I have to do to pass?

In order to pass the programme you must achieve the credit for each module by meeting the learning outcomes in each module descriptor. In Levels 4 and 5, assessment is on a pass/fail basis. In Level 6 you must achieve an overall mark of 40 to pass each module.

Attendance and time-keeping are key professional attributes in the industry. There are minimum attendance requirements (80% for levels 4 and 5, 90% for level 6) for all modules.

### **AWARDS**

This programme can lead to one of three awards: on successful completion of all Level 4 modules, the Certificate of Higher Education (CertHE); on successful completion of all Level 4 and 5 module the Diploma of Higher Education (DipHE); and on successful completion of 360 credits at Levels 4, 5 and 6, the BA (Hons) degree.

The CertHE is awarded without classification.

The DipHE is awarded without classification

The BA (Hons) is awarded without classification

You need to achieve BA (Hons) to be profiled as a graduate on the RADA website and to refer to yourself as a RADA Acting graduate.

#### ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

We audition everyone who applies: there are no required qualifications.

Entry to the programmes is by selection through a four-stage audition and interview process, during which audition panels will assess applicants' intellectual, creative and practical abilities to undertake the programme using the following criteria:

- Theatre/performance knowledge and understanding.
- Previous practical experience.
- Fluency in the English language
- Standard of work achieved during each stage of the audition and interview process.
- Engaged interaction with panel and other applicants.
- Physical, vocal and imaginative availability/ability as revealed through range of workshop exercises and interview.
- Ability to change in response to notes and direction
- Ability to work creatively in response to other applicants
- Playful and open engagement with the process at all stages of interview/workshop
- Capacity and readiness to engage in the training, with the provision of any reasonable adjustments to accommodate specific and disclosed impairments.
